

**ENTRY PROCEDURE FOR CANADIAN NURSERY STOCK AND
OTHER PLANTS AND SEEDS**

Special provision is made for the entry from Canada of specific classes of nursery stock and other plants and seeds which were produced in Canada, as opposed to plant materials imported from foreign countries into Canada and held or grown there for later sale. These plant materials produced in Canada must be accompanied by an official Canadian phytosanitary certificate.

INSTRUCTIONS

The following instructions apply to shipments other than by mail and are given for the guidance, respectively, of the permittee, the Canadian shipper, and the United States Collector of Customs at the border port of entry:

- ***THE PERMITTEE*** will retain the original copy of the permit, and will transmit a copy of the permit with a copy of this circular to the Canadian shipper.

- ***THE CANADIAN SHIPPER*** will forward (1) the copy of the permit, (2) the invoice, (3) the copy of the circular, and (4) the required Canadian certificate of inspection and origin to the border port of entry along with the shipment described in the permit. (Canadian certificates are issued by officials of the Plant Protection Division, Department of Agriculture, stationed at the following points in Canada: *St. John's, Nfld.; Corner Brook, Nfld.; Port aux Basques, Nfld.; Halifax, N.S.; Charlottetown, P.E.I.; Saint John, N.B.; Fredericton, N.B.; Quebec, Que.; Montreal, Que.; Mirabel Intrn'l Airport, Que.; Ottawa, Ont.; Toronto Intrn'l Airport, Ont.; Hamilton, Ont.; Niagara Falls, Ont.; London, Ont.; Windsor, Ont.; Thunder Bay, Ont.; Winnipeg, Man.; Regina, Sask.; Lethbridge, Alta.; Edmonton, Alta.; Calgary, Alta.; Penticton, B.C.; Vancouver Intrn'l Airport, B.C.; and Victoria, B.C.*).

- ***THE COLLECTOR OF CUSTOMS, U.S. BORDER PORT OF ENTRY.*** - The accompanying permit indicates what plant material may be imported thereunder. When authorized material is accompanied by an official Canadian certificate of inspection and origin, the shipment may be released.
